National Trails Day Fun On June 4th Wyndhurst participated in National Trails Day, a celebration of recreational trails in communities across the United States. Along the Stony Run trail, Wyndhurst's youngest neighbors enjoyed getting their commemorative booklets stamped at stations as they followed a map along the stream. Many participated in a tadpole release and learned about the fish and plants that make the Stony Run their home. Wyndhurst Station merchants offered free refreshments for all, and the

STONY RUN IMPROVEMENTS

The WIA continues to play a leadership role in the ongoing stewardship and development of the Stony Run as part of the Greater Roland Park Master Plan. The WIA helped the Bolton Street Synagogue, the Baltimore Jewish Environmental Network and Blue Water Baltimore secure a \$10,000 grant from the Chesapeake Bay Trust to support the removal of asphalt at the synagogue. The grant will allow for a pervious trail to be created along the stream. Blue Water Baltimore will be organizing volunteers to help with the depaving effort and to devine

STREET TREE CAMPAIGN

One of the most distinctive features of Wyndhurst is the mature trees that line our streets. Many of these trees were planted a hundred years ago when the neighborhood was first built, and they are reaching the end of their natural lives. Without a focused effort to plant new trees, Wyndhurst may lose its beautiful tree-lined streets.

The WIA is coordinating volunteers to track the condition of our tree canopy, coordinate with Forestry around maintenance issues and organize tree plantings. FRIENDS SCHOOL

In late June, representatives from the WIA met with the Friends School of Baltimore to discuss concerns regarding Friends' purchase of homes on Greenleaf Road and Charles Street in 2010 and Friends' efforts to improve access and traffic in and around the school. Both school officials and WIA representatives agreed to work more closely together in the future to develop traffic plans that are beneficial to both parties. MAINTENANCE COMMITTEE

The WIA Board established the Maintenance Committee (formerly the Maintenance and Beautification Committee)

in 2009 in order to keep the Wyndhurst neighborhood safe and well- maintained. One of our neighborhood's great assets is its pedestrian-friendly layout, enabling both the young and old to walk to shops, schools, places of worship and other amenities. For this reason, the committee encourages property owners to keep sidewalks clear of vegetation, ice and snow in accordance with city regulations.

The committee also encourages property owners to maintain yards and buildings to ensure the health, safety and general upkeep of the neighborhood's historic buildings. Maintenance includes keeping properties clear of debris and high weeds, and fixing problems such as vacant buildings, broken windows, significant peeling paint, missing or failing gutters, or deteriorated or rotting exterior elements.

• The Maintenance Committee follows this procedure: Committee learns about a maintenance concern from community members, block captains or its own members.

• The committee determines if the issue is serious enough to warrant action, and tries to understand the circumstances related to the issue. For example, it will not pursue an issue that is being addressed by the owner or if there are extenuating circumstances, such as fiscal constraints.

• If necessary, the committee takes the following actions: First, it communicates with the property owner and requests that the owner advise the committee as to how the issue will be resolved. This communication usually is done in the form of a letter from the president and committee chair. If a response is lacking or insufficient, the committee sends a second letter suggesting that it may involve the city if there is no adequate response. The Committee strives to deal with issues on a local level and avoid involvement by authorities.

• If the property owner is not responsive and/or the conditions of the property are especially egregious, the committee may register a formal complaint with Baltimore City. This action may be particularly warranted in the case of vacant or abandoned buildings. The committee tries to keep its activities confidential. Members currently serving on
